The district plans to purchase 800 Chrome Book devices and the Google for Education Suit to update existing technology in the district.

These devices will be able to process student data and applications faster than existing devices.

The district plans to purchase 5 new iPads for student use in the primary grades. These will replace outdated technology and allow for greater use of applications that are specifically targeted to the needs of young learners.

The district will also purchase 15 new Promethean boards with Chrome boxes. These boards will add to our existing infrastructure by equipping classrooms that do not have them and allowing for students to connect to them using their individual Chromebooks.

The district will purchase a monitor designed to assist students with programming music and lighting in their music and musical theater programs. This allows for an expansion of our arts program within the district.

The district is purchasing 32 gaming PC's for their computer technology and Esports Organization courses within the district. The district hopes to expand these programs to offer students more CTE pathways.

All devices are compatible with existing technology and planned purchase technology to allow for maximum connectivity of users for the purpose of learning.

All classroom technology proposed expenditures focus on meeting the individual needs of all learners. The purchase of 800 new Chromebooks allows for students to have the most up to date technology that is fully capable of running individual applications that help them to best learn. Updated devices allow for wireless speech to text and text to speech software for those students who receive accommodations in this area or are English language learners. Differentiated learning applications can seamlessly be placed on individual devices making learning most efficient for all students. Teachers can easily monitor student work created with devices in real time, allowing for them to assist and correct student work quickly. Because students are allowed to take these devices home, the reinforcement of those concepts covered during the school day can continue at home. Students will have the tools necessary to gain assistance with their work or review topics for all classes on one device.

Where appropriate, describe how the proposed technology purchases will enhance ongoing communication with parents and other stakeholders and help the district facilitate technology-based regional partnerships, including distance learning and other efforts.

Our district has been enhancing our digital learning network. Most recently, we have moved to a block schedule in our secondary school. This schedule has allowed our district to align schedule times with schools across our region. Because of this, many students are able to take advantage of course that they would not otherwise have been able to. Our 1:1 devices are essential to this programming because it allows for our students to complete their work over multiple applications. Since management systems and applications can vary based on district, it is important that students have the most up to date technology to be able to access their learning. As we continue our partnership with area districts, we continue to utilize Google Meet, Zoom, and other types of digital platforms to provide and receive classes.
